
# Reception Baseline Assessment

- ► Assessment will be administered in the first 6 weeks of your child starting school. It is a 1:1 assessment with the teacher.
- ▶ It is designed to be an inclusive assessment so SEND and EAL pupils can participate.
- ► The RBA purpose is to be a stable progress measure for children from EYFS to Yr6.
- Your child will not know they are being assessed!

# **Characteristics of Effective Learning**

- There are three characteristics of effective teaching and learning:
- Playing and exploring children will have opportunities to investigate and experience things and 'have a go.' Their senses will be active.
- Active learning children will have time and space to concentrate and keep on trying if they encounter difficulties and enjoy their achievements. They will actively engage with the environment both indoors and out.
- Creating and thinking critically we encourage and support children to use and develop their own ideas, make links between ideas and develop strategies for achieving what they wish.

- Showing curiosity about objects, events and people
- Using senses to explore the world around them





- Language comprehension starts at birth.
- Reading starts with talking. Spend time looking at books, talking about the pictures, what can the children see? What is happening? Instill a love of reading and books.
- When your child first starts to bring books home they may have few or no words. These are books to share and talk about together.
- The books will be banded against your child's RWI phonic set and will match the sounds they learn in school. Your child should read this book to you following the words with their finger. We would like you to listen to your child read 3-5 times a week minimum. Please sign the book each time you read. This should be kept in your child's bag and returned to school everyday.
- You will soon receive a home learning pack which will include sounds to practice at home.
- There will also be a seasonal home learning grid with suggested activities for you to complete with your child.

# **Snack time**

- ► Snack is provided for your child Please do not bring in snacks from home.
- ▶ We will also give children the opportunity to help make healthy snacks in class to encourage independence and opportunities to apply skills they are learning in different contexts such as counting, sorting and sharing with their friends.

# Lunchtime

- Lunch time is a sociable, enjoyable time where children and grown ups sit together to eat their lunch.
- ► Children are encouraged to use their knife and fork at the table and show good table manners at all times.
- ► Children are given a Free School Meal and they are encouraged to try a range of different foods.
- On site prepared meals are compulsory for pupils from YR until the end of year 2. Please ensure we have details of any allergies or religious observances.
